#### Program I

Janáček: Quartet No. 1, “Kreutzer Sonata”

Xenakis: *Tetras* (1983)

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Schubert: Quartet No. 13 in A minor, D. 804, “Rosamunde”

Sonically and conceptually, this program winds and coils itself with a ball of cathartic energy before releasing and untangling itself into one of the most beautiful quartets Schubert ever wrote.

#### Program II

Debussy: Quartet in G minor, Op. 10

Paul Wiancko: *Strange Beloved Land* (2013)

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Beethoven: Quartet in E minor, Op. 59, No. 2

Foreign lands and the exotic thread these works together. Commissioned by the Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival, Paul Wiancko’s *Strange Beloved Land* was written for and premiered by the Parker Quartet. An homage to the composer’s father who had recently passed, the work’s title comes from a documentary Wiancko’s father made about his visits to Romania. In Debussy’s instance the exotic comes from the Exposition Universelle of 1889 in Paris and its influence on his music. With Beethoven’s Quartet in E minor, Op. 59, No. 2, we find one of the boldest and most daring works from his middle period. From the intensity of the opening chords juxtaposed with moments of silence, to the profound simple beauty of the slow movement, each movement unfolds with an unexpected imagination and conviction that makes Beethoven’s music stand apart.

#### Program III

Debussy: Quartet in G minor, Op. 10

Janáček: Quartet No. 1, “Kreutzer Sonata”

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Beethoven: Quartet in E-Flat major, Op. 74, “Harp”

The expression of beauty can mask itself in infinite forms. Debussy colors his with impressionistic sensitivity, Janáček’s unbridled passion is the perfect musical narrative to Tolstoy’s novella, and Beethoven brilliantly transforms the string quartet into the most ancient of all string instruments, the harp. Celebrated in Hebrew culture and adored by the ancient Greeks, the harp has long symbolized love, beauty, and the otherworldly.
